How do I assess risks?



- *The **enterprise analysis tool** is primarily used to record, assess, and manage council-wide risks.*
- **Program hazard analysis** is used mainly for program areas within camps or high-adventure bases. It covers specific risks to the program areas. This tool has a defined way of assessing probability and severity of risks.
- **Safety checklists** are used for small events or campouts. Checklists provide a body of knowledge for running Scouting activities safely. Like an airline pilot reviewing a checklist before takeoff, these tools help to make sure critical safeguards are in place for a specific Scouting activity.
- The **Safety PAUSE** (Pause, Assess, Understand, Share, and Execute) process stresses the importance of a last-minute safety check in the field. By encouraging each Scout or adult leader to pause and reflect on the tasks at hand just before beginning, you have an opportunity to take necessary precautions to prevent any present or potential hazards. This is not a stand-alone tool. A formal risk assessment should be done first, such as a safety checklist or a program hazard analysis (PHA).

Risk Assessments a COEA might assist with at camp or on a committee

Program hazard analysis Purpose: This evaluation process is used to systematically identify, assess, and resolve hazards associated with program activities that support the vision, mission, and goals of the Boy Scouts of America. An analysis should be conducted for new program activities, for modifications to or expansions of existing activities, or for existing program activities with newly recognized hazards. Example might be a new trail for ATV or horseback riding.

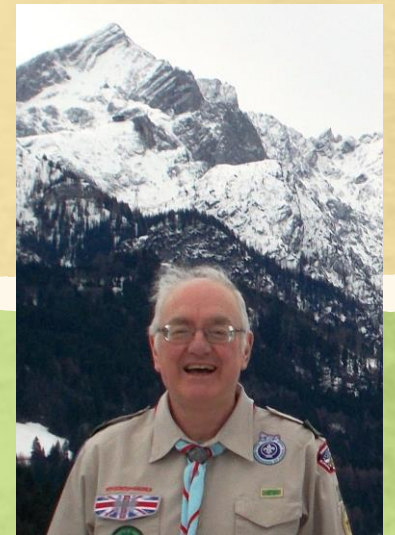

What are the Challenges of Recruiting in Transatlantic Council?

- Transient membership -
Most Scouts and adults are in the Council for a maximum of three years.
- Geography –
The Council covers almost half the globe and many time zones.
- Communication –
Most communication relies on electronic means, face-to-face communication opportunities are limited.

What are the Challenges of Training in Transatlantic Council?

- Availability of Trainers – Frequent loss of trained trainers due to relocation of personnel.
- Accessibility of training courses to participants – Cost of travel and accessibility.
- The need for online training for remote units.

What are the Challenges of Program Promotion in Transatlantic Council?

- Geography – In Districts with active OE advocates program promotion is fairly easy.
- Horizon District which covers Africa, Middle East and Central Asia requires online program support..
- Geography – Council camps, Wood Badge and NYLT all take place in Europe.

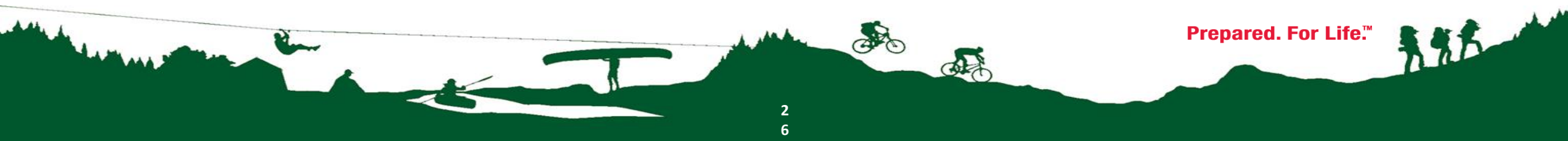
