Be Prepared


First-aid kits should be present wherever you might need them. That likely includes having a kit in your car, your home, your meeting location, and with your outdoor equipment for the next hike or camping trip. Since a first-aid kit is one of the essential items for Scout hiking, keeping one with your daypack is an easy way to assure you are prepared on the trail.



What should your kit have?

The contents of the kit can be as varied as the potential needs and the number of participants present, but it must always be stocked and ready for use. You should also regularly check for and replace expired items and those that need to be restocked after a trip. Have a kit that is suited to the number of participants and the length of time you'll need it.

These BSA-recommended items in a first aid kit equip you to handle minor injuries during outdoor activities and emergencies.

It should help youth and adults, at all program levels, understand the general principles behind Scouting's outdoor ethics program.


Learning Objectives:

- * "Leave No Trace is grounded in science and research and has been since its origins in the field of recreation ecology. This has evolved over the years as recreation-related impacts and associated monitoring has incorporated human dimensions of natural resources, striving to understand how and why humans cause impacts and, ultimately, how to influence behaviors to decrease recreational-related impacts. Our education and programming efforts are grounded in science and research."

By working with the public and those managing public lands, Leave No Trace focuses on educating people—instead of costly restoration programs or access restrictions—as the most effective and least resource-intensive solution to land protection."

What is the BSA's definition of "Conservation"?







A fellow Scouter & I are working on slides for our Univ. of Scouting conservation courses.

What is the BSA's definition of Conservation?

We read the Scout Handbook, Conservation Handbook, Environmental Science, Nature, Fish and Wildlife Management, Sustainability, Soil and Water Conservation, Bird Study and Insect Study merit badge books and the Council Conservation Committee Guidebook but none have a definition of conservation.







What is the BSA's definition of "Conservation"? We didn't have one.







What is Conservation?

Simply stated, conservation is "wise use". Conservation is about being thrifty and living sustainably. It's about managing and using our resources to ensure that they can provide for the needs of current and future generations. It's about making decisions and taking action to prevent overuse, neglect or destruction of our resources, and it's about good citizenship. In the Outdoor Code, Scouts, Venturers, Cub Scouts and Sea Scouts pledge to

be conservation-minded, meaning that we commit to making thoughtful decisions about using our resources responsibly.







What is Conservation? (cont.)

Scouts practice conservation in many ways... we participate in projects in our communities and in our wildlands to restore or enhance damaged natural conditions and habitats; we conserve energy, food, materials and natural resources by using them wisely and by not being wasteful; we promote outdoor ethics and use recreational sites and the outdoors responsibly. Practicing conservation and being conservation-minded is an important job... and as Scouts, it's what we do!

Why did Leave No Trace change the minimum age requirement to 18 for Level 1 Instructor (Trainer) Courses?







What about all of the youth who completed the Leave No Trace Trainer Courses? Will they be Leave No Trace Level 1 Instructors?







Yes!

All Leave No Trace Trainers (regardless of age) are now Leave No Trace Level 1 Instructors and will need to re-certify every two years.







What about Requirement 6. to earn the National Medal for Outdoor Achievement?







National Medal for Outdoor Achievement

6. Become a Leave No Trace Level 1 Instructor (formerly called Trainer) by completing the 16-hour training course from a recognized Leave No Trace Level2 Instructor (formerly called Master Educator).


The Outdoor Ethics & Conservation Subcommittee has been notified that the requirement will be changed to:

6. Complete a 16-hour Leave No Trace Skills Course from a certified Leave No Trace Level 1 or 2 Instructor.

Scouting's Outdoor Program offers us plenty of opportunities to enjoy our country's wide-open spaces, deep forests and high mountains, quiet waters, and raging rivers. Scouting also has a long history of caring for the health of these outdoor spaces, taking care to avoid unnecessary impacts, minimizing those that cannot be avoided, and restoring the damaged caused by overuse.



This is Scouting's "Outdoor Ethics" and the best tools to guide us are the Leave No Trace Seven Principles which help us to make good judgments whenever we recreate in the outdoors...

Through a cooperative agreement with Leave No Trace. He BSA is actively training Leave No Trace Level 2 Instructors to train Scouters everywhere to become Leave No Trace Level 1 Instructors BSA Leave No Trace Instructors work with their Council Outdoor Ethics Advocate to conduct the many programs designed to teach everyone in the Scouting movement the skills and ethics of Leave No Trace.

The BSA Leave No Trace Level 2 Instructor Course provides participants with comprehensive training in Level No Trace skills and ethics, instruction and practice on effective teaching methods, and information on the important role of outdoor ethics in Scouting's outdoor programs.

Course Requirements:

- Be a current member of the BSA.
- Be at least 18 years of age by the time of the course.
 Meet the Height/Weight requirements of the High Adventure Base you will attend.
- Provide a current BSA Health and Medical Record signed by a physician (parts A throught
- Record signed by a physician (parts A through C including the Risk Advisory of the High Adventure Base you plan to attend).

 Complete a BSA swim test and be classified as
- Complete a BSA swim test and be classified as a "swimmer" prior to arrival. (Northern Tier canoeing course only).

Summit Bechtel Reserve Glen Jean, WV May 12 – 17, 2024 \$375 Course Fee

This 5-day course features a day of classroom instruction at the Summit, 3 days of practical application at a campsite and a final day of classroom instruction.

The course does not require hiking long distances. Camping is preferred but optional. This course may be especially desirable for individuals who have mobility or endurance concerns.

All food, class materials, and group gear will be provided by the Summit Bechtel Reserve. Participants will be required to provide personal gear that is typically needed for overnight camping, including your tent.


